Equipping the Congregation for Outreach and Mission

Are you inspired by the idea of doing outreach and mission for your congregation, but lack adequate knowledge or resources? Or are you a seasoned practitioner who feels called to reassess your congregation's social witness and set a new direction?

When thinking about outreach for mission, it helps to look inward (at congregational renewal) and outward (at social renewal) at the same time. Building a "mission infrastructure" depends on assessing program options, understanding how to recruit and build teams, analyzing your neighborhood, measuring effectiveness, and integrating charity and justice.

Course Instructors

Roderic Frohman is Chair of the Board of the Center for the Congregation in Public Life at CRCDS. He has served as Associate Pastor for Church in Society at Third Presbyterian Church in Rochester since 1998, supporting the eight teams which conduct 40 outreach programs. He is currently Moderator of the Presbytery of Genesee Valley and co-founder of the Rochester Area Interfaith Hospitality Network (RAIHN). He has M.Div. and D.Min. degrees from Princeton Theological Seminary and has been a city pastor for 37 years. Rod and his wife, Marcia, have two adult daughters.

Dana Horrell is the Executive Director of the Center for the Congregation in Public Life at Colgate Rochester Crozer Divinity School. He has a Ph.D. in Practical Theology from the University of Chicago, M.Div. from Drew University, and a Master's of Public Administration from Syracuse University. Dana is Pastor of Jordan United Methodist Church, and has previously served congregations in Central New York. He is a consultant to congregations seeking to strengthen their public role in the world. He and his wife, Marti, have two children.

When it comes to outreach and mission, clergy and lay leaders are often pulled in too many directions and lack adequate resources. This seminar takes a comprehensive approach to social ministries, focusing on best practices which build congregational culture and capacity for social justice.

Through lecture, discussion, and multi-media presentations, participants are provided examples of "best practices" in mission and outreach. By day's end, students will use a comprehensive assessment tool to determine their congregation's unique strengths and will develop a plan to strengthen capacity for public ministry. Several participants have reported taking their workbook home to share with their ministry team. One student said the course offered "a fresh perspective—lifting me up from operational details to a broader perspective."
